DEPARTMENT OF LABOR/EMPLOYMENT & TRAINING ADMINISTRATION

Recovery Act funds for Training and Employment Services under WIA and the Wagner-Peyser Act are available for allotment as follows:

- ❖ \$1,188,000,000 for youth activities, including summer employment for youth;
- ❖ \$495,000,000 for adult services, including supportive services and needs-related payments. Priority for receipt of these services is to go to recipients of public assistance and other low-income individuals as described in 134(d)(4)(E) of WIA;
- ❖ \$1,435,500,000 for dislocated worker training and employment services and national reserve; and
- ❖ \$396,000,000 for Wagner-Peyser Act activities; \$247,500,000 of those funds are to support RES for unemployment insurance claimants.

The above figures represent the amount of Recovery Act funds as specified in the Act less one percent which is authorized to be retained at the federal level for program administration and oversight.

February 17	Enactment of the Recovery Act.
Week of March 2	Grant agreement amendments sent to state grantees ETA publishes allotments TEGL
Week of March 9	States must return the signed version of the grant agreement
Week of March 16	ETA publishes policy guidance on Recovery Act Funds ETA publishes guidance on State Plan modifications Funds are available to states through a Notice of Obligation
April 15	States submit extension request for PY 2009 State Plan, waiver extension requests, and proposed levels of performance

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING & URBAN DEVELOPMENT:

The Recovery Act includes \$13.61 billion for projects and programs administered by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, nearly 75 percent of which was allocated to state and local recipients on February 25, 2009 – only eight days after President Obama signed the Act into law. Recovery Act investments in HUD programs will be not just swift, but also effective: they will generate tens of thousands of jobs, modernize homes to make them energy efficient, and help the families and communities hardest hit by the economic crisis. The remaining 25 percent of funds will be awarded via competition in the coming months. Additional guidance on the implementation of all funds will be routinely provided on this website.

CORPORATION FOR NATIONAL & COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Recovery Act includes \$201 million in funding for the Corporation for National and Community Service to support an expansion of AmeriCorps State and National and AmeriCorps VISTA programs. This investment is a strong vote of confidence in the value of national service in engaging citizens in addressing unmet needs and strengthening communities.

The Corporation received funding in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (Recovery Act) to put approximately 13,000 additional AmeriCorps State and National and AmeriCorps VISTA members to work through national service, meeting needs of vulnerable populations and communities during the current economic recession. Funding from the Recovery Act may also be

used to provide current grantees with relief from requirements to provide matching funds. The Corporation also received funding to improve its information technology systems.
